A Snapshot of Demographic and Economic Characteristics of Immigrants in the Metro Area¹

















17.2% of immigrants, or **73,264**, living in the metro area had limited English language proficiency. Among them, the top five languages spoken at home other than English were:





- 8 According to New American Economy's report New Americans in Wayne County (2019), there were a total of 7,961 immigrant entrepreneurs in Wayne County, Michigan making up 16.3% of business owners in 2017. While 6% of the U.S.-born population in the county were entrepreneurs, 9.7% of foreign-born residents worked for their own businesses. Immigrant entrepreneurs generated \$145.3 million in business income in 2017.
